Part 1 - Ice Breaker

- Was the significance of numbers in Revelation something new to you? What other numbers in Revelation do you think have significance?

Part 2 - Review the sermon

- This week, we were reminded the world doesn't revolve around me and my happiness but God and his glory. How does that change the way I look at life and my challenges?
- Pastor Kurt mentioned Eckard Tolle's book, The New Earth which says, "You are the highest truth in the universe." What examples can you think of in our culture that show us how much we worship ourselves?
- The wrath of God is just as real and his love. The Bible talks about wrath 215 times in 208 verses. Do you think it is important to talk about God's wrath? Why isn't it talked more about today? Why would the blood propitiation of God's wrath be so offensive as to be called, "Cosmic child abuse" by some? Why is it so essential?
- Christ won his victory through suffering and death. How does our suffering and possible martyrdom "fill up what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, the church" (Col. 1:24)?
- What would you say to a "health, wealth and prosperity preacher" after learning the role of suffering in the Christian life for the growth of God's kingdom and the spread of the gospel?
- To go from Revelation 5:9 to Revelation 7:9 you must pass through Revelation 6:9, which is the price tag for reaching the nations. What role is God calling you to play in reaching the nations? Is fear of pain, suffering or death keeping you from being involved?
